I want you to know that my local constituent service office opened on Monday, January 5 and my staff and I are available to assist you with all your state government needs.

The office is located at 436 S. Main Street in Pittsburgh's West End neighborhood. Office hours will be 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday, with extended hours until 6:00 PM on Thursdays. The office phone number is (412) 928-9514.

I also plan to hold constituent hours at the Avalon Borough Building at 640 California Avenue in Avalon. Satellite hours will be held in the Avalon Borough Building from 10:00 AM to 1 PM Tuesday and Thursday and by appointment. The phone number for the satellite office is (412) 761-5820, extension 15.

A wide variety of services are available at my office, including Penn Dot paperwork, applications for and assistance with state such programs as and PACE/PACENET the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program, information on other state programs and services, and brochures and publications on a variety of topics important to local residents.

My office will also be offering assistance with state and federal income tax returns. Assistance will be offered by appointment on a limited basis, so residents are encouraged to call early to make an appointment. To qualify for help, your income must be less than \$35,000 per year.
